Advent Candle Liturgy The Ashburn Family

One: In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth, And set lights in the sky—sun and moon and stars. By these stars, our ancestors charted their journeys. By these stars, they knew God was with them.

Two: Today we light one candle to bring the fire of the stars down from heaven to earth, to rest among us.

We name this candle Hope.

(The first Advent candle is lit.)

Prayer of Confession

We seem to revisit the same problems over and over without really looking for ways to move forward. So much in our lives and in our world seems played out and tired. Forgive us, God, for our lack of faith in your power and your promises. Help us to hope even when things seem hopeless.

Assurance of Forgiveness

One: Listen now to the prayer of an ancient poet:

"For God alone my soul waits in silence,
for my hope is from him.

God alone is my rock and my salvation,
my fortress; I shall not be shaken.

On God rests my deliverance and my honor;
my mighty rock, my refuge is in God.

Trust in him at all times, O people;
pour out your heart before him;
God is a refuge for us."

Two: Even when better days seem very far away and the weight of the world seems to crush any sense of possibility, we chart our path by the star of hope, trusting in God's promises.

One: Let us pray:
Lord Jesus, help us to become the signs of hope that others are searching for.
As these candles are but a glimpse of the light of the heavens,
help us to be a glimpse of heaven's hope. Amen.



Mark 13:24-37

[Jesus said,] "But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

"From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

"But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch.

Therefore, keep awake--for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."

By employing an energetic Irish folk song for its melody, this ballad-like paraphrase of the Magnificat, Mary's song at her meeting with her relative Elizabeth (Luke 1:46–55), recaptures both the wonder and the faith of the young woman who first recognized what God was doing.



While We Are Waiting, Come



This simple and meditative Advent hymn is so uncomplicated in both text and tune that it can be learned quickly and sung without reference to a book, which might make it effective as a prayer response. It would also lend itself to improvised stanzas on appropriate occasions.
